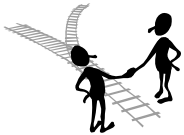




A TALE OF TWO TOPICS

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Members,

Right now our League is considering a change. As many of you already know, we are considering merging with the East San Diego County League. And as anyone who has been a League member for any length of time, you know that there is a process already set up for us to do this. The following are the steps we need to follow:

1. Local League boards discuss the possible merge and decide on a recommendation to look into the process..
2. Membership of each local League is given the opportunity to discuss and approve the proposed change.
3. The formal application needs to be completed jointly by the two Leagues.
4. The application is sent to the LWVC, which, if approved, will then be forwarded to the LWVUS.
5. Once the approval is granted by the LWVUS, steering committees can be formed to create new bylaws, program, budget, and nominating committee.

6. Members in each League vote at their annual meeting to combine. If approved, they then meet together and continue the annual meeting as one group.

7. The new League sends a copy of its new bylaws to the LWVUS for their permanent record.

We have done the first step and the East County League has done the first and second part. This month at the January Unit meetings, we will have time to discuss any concerns members may have. I want to share my thoughts on the merge in the remainder of this letter.

Our membership committee works very hard to get even one new member. This merge will give us almost 50 members, members who have League experience and knowledge.

Our nominating committee works hard to find members who are willing and able to take on Board assignments. This merge will add amazing, active women, whom I have met, and am very pleased that they will be joining us.

As I planned our Education study, I invited them to work with us on this project.. My intention was to help a small League with a big project. One of their members, Elana Levenscraig, worked with our committee, helped with the research and with our presentations, along with presenting to her own League.

Their Program Chair, Marietta Lassaline, has been working with our Program Committee and, as you will see, has arranged for an additional presentation about hydraulic fracturing at the El Cajon library on January 19. The more I work with their Board members, the more excited I am about this merge.

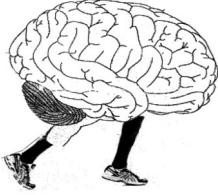

One of our oldest and most impressive members, **Millie Pilot**, passed away on December 3rd. Millie has been a faithful member of the La Jolla Unit and often took wonderful photos at the general meetings and fundraisers. Every year, she sent out a photo montage of her year - her travels, exercise, visitors, family, cats, and her work at the computer. Millie moved to La Jolla in her retirement from Hammond, Indiana where she had a radio program and was the political editor for WJOB. She was very well respected and was considered the fourth arm of Indiana's government because she read every bill and knew all the players in state government. She received many awards including one for Outstanding Professionalism in Broadcast Communication from the Hammond Rotary Club in 1983, Indiana Woman of the Year, and one of ten Outstanding Women from



the United Press in 1962. Her broadcast work and membership in the Hammond LWV spanned forty years from 1950-1990. Millie's life was a journey and her contributions to the work and the history of the state of Indiana were very significant. She was of petit stature, but she impacted many lives and will be dearly missed. At Millie's memorial service, there were favorite sayings of hers all over the room including:

- Over the hill and picking up speed. (Millie worked out at the gym or with her trainer at home plus went swimming regularly in a class in Pt. Loma until very recently.)
- You can change your life if you are willing to change your thinking - remember, you always have a choice.
- Live, love, laugh - it is not the years in your life but the life in your years.

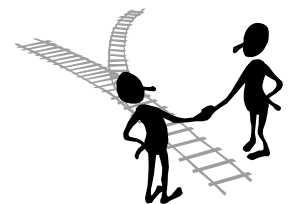

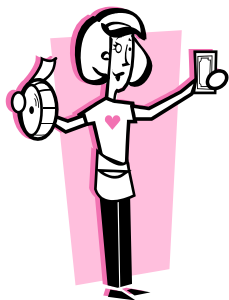

LWVUS, ILO, and LWVSD Program Planning Coming January 21

Program planning is the heart of League and is what sustains us as a grassroots organization. It is very important and like voting in political elections, we should all take part in League program planning. Mark your calendar right now for Saturday, January 21, 10 a.m. - 2 p.m., home of Beryl Flom, 1577 Vista Claridad, Lajolla CA 92037, lunch provided.

This year we have the opportunity to propose issues that we feel should be considered by our National League for a new study, an update of an existing position, or as an issue for emphasis and action. Our suggestions are forwarded to the National Board for consideration by the National Convention delegates in June.

This is the year we also suggest issues for the ILO (SD County League) to consider studying, updating, or have as an issue for emphasis/action during the coming two years. These are forwarded to the ILO Board for consideration at the ILO 2012 convention.

Program planning for the local League is done annually. Suggestions received from members at the program planning meeting regarding local studies, updates, or issues for emphasis/action will go to the LWVSD Board and then to our Annual Meeting for consideration.

Check the websites of the LWV, San Diego County LWV, and our own LWVSD website to get up-to-date on the current positions of these three levels of League. Use your search engine. They are easy websites to find.

Terms and definitions used in program planning:

- **Study** The process of gathering information for discussion by members with a view of reaching consensus for the purpose of establishing positions on a subject adopted by convention or annual meeting. Studies are conducted at all levels of League. A study usually takes one to two years.
- **Update** A study of limited scope approved by the Board or Annual Meeting to reevaluate existing LWV positions in light of new information, changed circumstance, and/or conflict with another position with a view to considering a position change.
- **Issue for Emphasis** An issue/topic adopted by Convention/Annual Meeting delegates, as a program item on which Leagues will mutually focus their efforts. It may include concerted action on an existing position, and/or a new study or update, and/or education.

NAVY PIER

A letter from the League of Women Voters of San Diego was presented at the last of three workshops held by the Midway Museum at the Port District on Saturday December 10. The purpose of the workshop was to gather public input on a proposed plan for Navy Pier which includes a five acre park on the upper deck, space for 500

cars on the lower deck, and a 500' "Wings of Freedom" sculpture and amphitheater at the end of the pier. The letter objected to the processing and timing of the proposal saying that three town meetings scheduled in a two week period between Thanksgiving and Christmas does not offer much opportunity for meaningful public review and suggesting that perhaps a design competition for an iconic sculpture would be a better way to engage the community.

International Relations Committee Update

The Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge award for my *Union-Tribune*-published article on women’s suffrage was great fun to receive, especially with the added touch of having six League members in attendance at the beautiful Admiral Baker Clubhouse for the November 14 luncheon. What a treat to have at my table: Debbie Blum, Lila Brill, Anne-Marie Kaukonen, Shirley Larson, Mary McKenzie, and Rosemary Straley. I had invited my cousin to lend a little support, so I was quite overwhelmed to have six Leaguers there as well as two others from the United Nations Association and AAUW. Two U-T journalists also received awards for their articles, which pleased me to be among professionals.

Coming up in February is the annual session (the 56th) of the United Nations’ Commission on the Status of Women, February 27 – March 9. As of today, five Leaguers from San Diego have been pre-registered; no one is under penalty of law for having to cancel, but I do need to pre-register any others by January 17. During the two weeks in New York, the newly formed UN Women and affiliated non-governmental organizations have scheduled approximately 250 workshops and panel

presentations for us to attend. LWVUS typically organizes at least one workshop or panel presentation; in 2010, LWVUS arranged the best program on human trafficking that I have ever attended!

During the unit meetings on women’s issues, many of you expressed interest in learning more about human trafficking. You are invited to participate in a one-day workshop, “It’s Global and It’s Local: Human Trafficking,” to be held April 28 at the San Diego County Office of Education. Funding has been provided to offset some of the costs, which lowers the fee for the full-day event that includes continental breakfast, lunch, and program to less than \$25. The April 28 workshop will address the following: Prevention (e.g., a screening of the S.D. County Office of Education-funded documentary, *Indoctrinated: The Grooming of Children into Prostitution*); Protection (i.e., rescuing and restoring trafficked girls and women); and Prosecution (e.g., law enforcement and programs to stop trafficking). LWVUS Advocacy

LWVUS has called on President Obama to make nominations to the FEC. In a letter and press conference, the League and coalition partners called for changes in the dysfunctional Federal Election Commission (FEC). We were live-tweeting from the event.

LWVUS sent a letter to senators urging them to oppose the termination of the Election Assistance Commission (EAC), the only federal agency that devotes its full resources to improving American election.

LWVC Initiative and Referendum Update Study

The LWVC Initiative and Referendum Update Study is moving along and learning a lot in the process. The group members are busy at work researching, conducting interviews, and holding meetings and conference calls. For the past few months the members have held several conference calls where they clarify their topics and communicate their research findings with each other. As members find new, interesting articles, those pieces of information are shared with the LWVC website and Facebook group. END THE DEATH PENALTY WITH SAFE CALIFORNIA INITIATIVE

Volunteers gathering ballot-qualifying signatures

The League of Women Voters of California believes it's past time that we halt executions. That's why it endorses the SAFE California Initiative, which is presently being circulated to collect the necessary signatures to qualify it for the November 2012 ballot. (SAFE stands for Savings, Accountability & Full Enforcement). If it passes, the initiative will replace the death penalty with permanent imprisonment (life without the possibility of parole), including the conversion of existing death sentences to that alternative.

This endorsement is in accord with the LWVUS position supporting the end of the death penalty. The initiative is functionally equivalent to SB 490, a legislative bill endorsed by the California League.

Besides being ineffective and subject to error, the death penalty is a serious fiscal drain. Replacing it with permanent imprisonment would save the state a significant amount of money, estimated at \$1 billion over five years. A study released in July 2011 by U.S. Appeals Court Judge Arthur Alarcon and Paula Mitchell, Professor at Loyola Law School, found that death penalty cases, including legal costs and additional costs of housing inmates on death row, cost California taxpayers more than \$184 million every year. On average, \$308 million has been spent for each of the thirteen executions that have



been carried out since the death penalty was reinstated in California in 1978.

While we waste millions on the death penalty, about half of serious violent crimes (homicides and rapes, at 46% and 56% respectively) go unsolved every year owing to limited law-enforcement resources. The SAFE California Act would use some of the savings from ending the death penalty to create a fund to increase the rate at which the serious crimes of homicide and rape are solved by funding additional law-enforcement capacity and would require that convicted murderers work behind bars and pay restitution into a victims' compensation fund.

The SAFE California Act and the campaign to gather qualifying signatures on its behalf are supported by a coalition of law-enforcement professionals, family members of murder victims, and individuals exonerated of wrongful conviction, as well as religious and civil rights groups.
